September 3<sup>rd</sup>, the WI members and distinguished guests: Shannon Pyziak, Reeve; James Bezan, MP; Derek Johnson, MLA; Gisela Nolting, ACWW Manitoba Coordinator; Debra Barrett, MWI President gathered to honour and celebrate 12 amazing members who have volunteered 25 to 70 years in their community, for a grant total of 476 years. These dedicated women were presented certificates of recognition and words of appreciation from the dignitaries. Congratulations were read from FWIC President Lynn MacLean, and ACWW Canada Area President Marie Kenny.

Dear Society President,

I hope this email finds you well.

Central Office has launch the TWC Sponsorship Fund. Following the Board's approval of £20,000 from the Lady Aberdeen Scholarship Fund, we are excited to support as many delegates as possible within the allocated budget.

We are looking forward to receive applications from around the world and kindly request your assistance in identifying and recommending individuals from your Area who may meet the following criteria:

- Aged between 18–35 (please note this is not a strict requirement as applicants of all ages are welcome, however we will be prioritising applicants within these ages)
- First-time attendees of the Triennial World Conference
- Members of an active ACWW Member Society

The deadline for submissions will be **30 September 2025**, and we aim to notify applicants within two weeks of the closing date.

Each sponsorship will cover:

- Full conference registration and Accommodation (twin share rate)
- o We encourage applications from two delegates within the same society to attend together as this will ensure they are in attendance with someone they know.
- o Travel to and from the Westin Hotel in Ottawa, Canada (including visa, travel insurance, and airport transfer)

Our aim is to minimise out-of-pocket expenses for sponsored delegates.

For visa support, we will provide a letter confirming ACWW's support and sponsorship and that this is a bona fide international conference registered with Canada's IRCC (Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada).



Not a quilter then why not try a paper collage to bring a pop of colour and interest to a window.




**How to**: Cut out a piece of wax paper one inch larger than the size of the finished tree. Place a completed drawing, using the pattern pieces, behind the wax paper. Cut out shapes/squares of tissue paper in the colours you want for your picture, following the pattern pieces and sizes. Use white school glue (Elmers) glue your tissue pieces to the wax paper following the pattern. Make sure your tissue paper is saturated in glue. Let dry overnight. When fully dry peel off the wax paper and create a paper frame to display your work. Hang from your window frame on a colourful ribbon.

Toronto, ON — Human trafficking is happening in our neighborhoods to people we pass every day — and too often, we don't see it. This October, a powerful three-part virtual series invites everyday people to open their eyes, raise awareness, and take meaningful action.

Uprooting Trafficking: A 3-Part Series on Understanding, Healing & Action runs October 27, 28, and 30 from 7:00–8:00 PM ET on Zoom. Endorsed by the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada (WI Canada), this free event brings together 14 survivors and advocates from 13 organizations across Canada and beyond. Each evening is uniquely themed, exploring the realities of trafficking, pathways of healing and reintegration, and how communities can recognize, respond, and take action.
